The best way to answer the questions, is based on whether or not the state of Utah has a waste facility licensed to receive the waste. Based on projections, the current facility does not have a 30 -45 year capacity, therefore, several things must happen for LES to have disposal options in Utah for that long of a period. The answer is not a yes or no, but maybe, maybe not and depends on several things: 1) if the current facility gets an expansion through the Legislature and Governor(s), or 2) another facility gets approval from the Legislature or Governor. Its difficult to know what politicians will do, especially in the future. Hope this answers your questions.
