The reference license conditions for San Onofre Nuclear Generating Station, Units 2 and 3 (SONGS 2 and 3) require Southern California Edison (SCE) to:

- i. By July 2, 1983, SCE shall provide evidence that it has undertaken further efforts to assemble and to keep current as reasonably complete a list as possible of housebound people within the plume emergency planning zone (EPZ) who would require transportation assistance in the event of an evacuation, and
- ii. By July 2, 1983, SCE shall provide evidence that a training program has been developed and initiated to assist Orange County Transit District bus drivers in the discharge of their responsibilities in the event of a radiological emergency at San Onofre.

In response to the first condition regarding "housebound people", the County of Orange and City of San Clemente are the two jurisdictions by state law who have responsibility for protection of the public within their respective jurisdictions (SCE has no authority in this area). This includes management and potential evacuation of housebound individuals within their assigned portions of the EPZ. Enclosures (1) and (2) are provided to detail the extent of the total program implemented by these two jurisdictions to manage the housebound individuals during an emergency situation. For your information, the County of Orange also handles such matters for the residents of the City of San Juan Capistrano, at the city's request.

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The License Condition indicates that the applicants must assemble and maintain a complete listing of housebound individuals. The two jurisdictions have not only assembled and maintained a complete listing, they have categorized, verified, automated, and established procedures for assisting these individuals. Additionally, they have allocated resources to support these procedures, and finely tested the procedures during drills and exercises.

SCE's plans, and those of the offsite agencies, have exceeded the identified request in that we have developed a program to include identification, verification, allocation of resources, and testing of procedures to care for the housebound individuals during an emergency. SCE has supported the jurisdictions' efforts with special assistance cards included in SCE's Public Information Packages, computer hardware systems, and professional expertise in establishment of their programs. SCE, of course, will continue to work with the offsite agencies to support their efforts.

Additionally, responsive to the Atomic Safety and Licensing Appeal Board concerns, the jurisdictions have made further and continuing efforts in an attempt to locate individuals that qualify for special assistance. The jurisdictions have worked through other county agencies, the medical community, senior citizens YANA (You Are Not Alone) Program, civic groups and others to locate special cases. In addition, phone contact has been made with virtually every person on the list to confirm the particular circumstances associated with each case. The jurisdictions are confident that they have contacted a high percentage of this special population.

In response to the Licensing Condition regarding the need for Emergency Plan Training of the Orange County Transit District (OCTD) bus drivers, several meetings have been held between SCE and the OCTD to discuss the logistics of implementing the program. The OCTD has been receptive to the idea of training the bus drivers on radiological effects and has been very cooperative throughout the conduct of the program in committing the required resources.

Ms. Carole Hopwood of Orange County, with assistance from SCE Corporate Emergency Planning staff, conducted a one-hour training session on May 10 for the Capistrano Unified School District bus drivers. At that time, approximately 60 drivers were trained using the State Office of Emergency Services (OES) lesson plans on Ionizing Radiation and Classification Event Levels. Also, information was presented regarding Orange County's Emergency Plan's Traffic and Evacuation Routes, Direction and Control, etc.

In addition, arrangements were made for two employees of the OCTD Training Department to attend the State OES Emergency Worker Training Program which was conducted May 23 through 25 by General Physics for State OES. The Emergency Worker Training Program was jointly developed by State OES and the three utilities with nuclear power plants in the state of California to provide a uniform training program for offsite nuclear emergency response personnel.

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A subsequent meeting was held June 13 to plan the implementation of the training for the OCTD drivers and identify the instructional content of the Emergency Plan Training for the instructors. An agreement was reached that the two OCTD instructors that were trained in May would train the remaining five OCTD instructors with technical assistance provided by SCE Corporate Emergency Planning staff on June 17 from 9:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Additionally, Steve Walsh, Superintendant of Operations for OCTD, provided information to the instructors regarding OCTD Emergency Plan related to San Onofre Nuclear Generating Station and Orange County Emergency Management Division.

The OCTD instructor staff, equipped with lesson plans, slides, and student handouts, will begin the instruction of the bus drivers on June 29, and complete the training July 25 in accordance with Enclosure 3. Specific lesson plans from the State OES Emergency Worker Training Program include Biological Effects of Radiation, Event Classification and Emergency Worker Protection. Instruction will also be provided regarding OCTD's own Emergency Plan. Rosters of the training will be sent to SCE for a permanent record.

Currently, negotiations are being undertaken to insure the annual re-training of bus drivers regarding their Emergency Worker responsibilities as well as provisions for the instruction of new drivers.

SCE believes that the reference license conditions are satisfied. If you have any questions on this matter, please call me.
