GENE DACUS: NRC Ops Center, Gene Dacus.

(b)(6) over at CIA WINPAC. I've been in contact with you guys through the night. I just wondered if you had any, any updates since I last talked to you.

GENE DACUS: Who are you?

13 has said thank you, but no thanks.

MALE PARTICIPANT: And this is -- what is this?

MALE PARTICIPANT: This is a nuclear power plant the fuel cycle facilities, the RPR. Okay?

MALE PARTICIPANT: Oh, the, the Hill staffer. Yeah, we're just listening in.

Hello?

BETTE COOK: Hello?

MALE PARTICIPANT: Hi.

BETTE COOK: Hi, this is Betty Cook, USAID legislative affairs.

Do we have someone else on the line?

SPIROS DROGGITIS: Hi. This is Spiros Droggitis from the NRC, Congressional Affairs.

BETTE COOK: Okay.

SPIROS DROGGITIS: I was asked to call in, just --

BETTE COOK: Sure.

SPIROS DROGGITIS: -- I think, just to

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1 listen in.

2 BETTE COOK: Glad to have you on the call.

3 Thank you.

4 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Thank you.

5 It's supposed to be at two; right?

6 BETTE COOK: It's at two o'clock.

7 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Okay.

8 BETTE COOK: We're, we're a little bit
9 earlier.

10 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Oh.

11 BETTE COOK: I just knew there was somebody
12 out there on the line, and I wanted to check in. That's
13 okay.

14 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Yep, okay.

15 BETTE COOK: Thank you. I'm going to put,
16 put upon mute for a second --

17 SPIROS DROGGITIS: That's fine.

18 BETTE COOK: -- until we get closer.

19 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Okay, great.

21 KAREN GATZ: Hello?

22 MALE PARTICIPANT: Hello?

23 KAREN GATZ: Yes, hold --

24 BETTE COOK: Hi. This is Betty Cook,
25 USAID's Legislative Affairs office on the line.

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1 Who else has joined us?

2 KAREN GATZ: Yes, hello. This is Karen
3 Gatz, State Department Legislative Affairs.

4 BETTE COOK: Hi there, Karen.

5 KAREN GATZ: Hi there, that he.

6 BARBARA LARKINS: Hi, Betty. It's
7 Barbara Larkins.

8 BETTE COOK: Oh, Barbara. Glad you're on.

9 We're just a few minutes away from two, so
10 we're going to give ourselves a little time here to get
11 some Hill staff on the line. Okay?

12 BARBARA LARKINS: Okay.

13 KAREN GATZ: Okay.

14 MARY (SENATOR INOUE'S OFFICE): Hi, this
15 is Mary calling from Senator Inoue's office.

16 BETTE COOK: I'm sorry; the name again?

17 MARY (SENATOR INOUE'S OFFICE): Mary.

18 BETTE COOK: Oh, yes. Hi. Good to have
19 you on the line.

20 MARY (SENATOR INOUE'S OFFICE): Thanks for
21 having us.

22 RICK KESSLER: Hey, Betty, it's Rick
23 Kessler.

24 BETTE COOK: Rick Kessler.

25 RICK KESSLER: And Diana Ohlbaum.

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1 BETTE COOK: Diana -- now where would you
2 to be from? Now, I'm kidding, of course.

3 RICK KESSLER: I'm out in California, so
4 it's a bit of a hike.

5 BETTE COOK: We'll give it a few more
6 minutes, folks, but thank you very much for giving us
7 some time here.

8 [LONG PAUSE.]

9 BETTE COOK: Well, it is two o'clock, and
10 we don't want to hold up those of you who have taken time
11 out of your Saturday day off, so we will go ahead and
12 get started.

13 Again, I'm Betty Cook with USAID's
14 Legislative and Public Affairs Office.

15 Just to let you know, Administrator [Rajiv
16 Shah] has asked us to keep you informed, and we propose
17 to do that through daily calls at two o'clock each day,
18 tomorrow included, and we'll do this for as long as
19 things are, continue to be very active. So I hope you
20 will plan to join us during the week as well.

21 This is an interagency effort. USAID is
22 taking the lead on the humanitarian assistance portion,
23 and we do have several other agencies represented on the
24 line. But Mark Bartolini, who is the director of
25 USAID's Office of Foreign Disaster Assistance will

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1 brief you today on humanitarian assistance portion.

2 Before Mark begins, have there been any
3 other Hill staff to join us?

4 (No response.)

5 BETTE COOK: Well, if not, thank you again.

6 And Mark, would you like to --

7 MARK BARTOLINI: Sure. Thanks, Betty.

8 So the Pacific Tsunami Warning Center, this
9 morning at 1:36 a.m. Eastern Standard Time, canceled the
10 tsunami warning for all countries in the Pacific region.

11 At 10 o'clock this morning, the numbers
12 that we're getting, Japan's national [indiscernible,
13 possibly police agency] is reporting 686 deaths, 642
14 missing, and 1,426 injured from the quake.

15 In addition, the earthquake damaged nearly
16 13,000 buildings, 2,500 of which have been destroyed;
17 2,400 flooded; and more than 100 burned throughout
18 northeastern Japan. The --

23 [CONFERENCE CALL INITIATED:]

24 MARK BARTOLINI: Enlisted, seconded four
25 nuclear experts that have joined our disaster

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1 assistance response team in Japan. One flew out last
2 night; three are en route today. And they'll be hoping
3 from the field to assess situations, to be a liaison with
4 their Japanese counterparts to see if there's any
5 assistance that they might require. In addition, we've
6 secured two experts from the Nuclear Regulatory
7 Commission who are here with our response management
8 team.

9 Obviously, we're following this very
10 closely, but also, we can't stress enough that this is
11 a very developed country who has significant capacity
12 to deal with issues like this, and we're confident that
13 they are doing the best that they can to handle the
14 circumstances. And we certainly don't want to be in the
15 position to speculate. I know there's been a lot of
16 different media reports out there, but the Government
17 of Japan has been forthcoming in terms of their
18 assessment of the situation.

19 Now, let me turn a little bit to USAID's
20 response thus far. About an hour and a half after the
21 quake struck, we stood up a response management team at
22 2:15 a.m. And following from that, we put on standby,
23 and then deployed, two, what we call USAR Heavy teams.
24 That's Urban Search and Rescue, and "Heavy" means that
25 they go out eventually with everything they have. I

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1 thought I'd go into a little bit of detail of the
2 capability of these teams because I think it is
3 important, given what they are facing right now.

4 First, I should tell you when they're going
5 to arrive. There are en route as we speak, and they'll
6 be arriving early tomorrow morning local time in Japan.
7 They're arriving in four separate, three separate
8 planes, two carrying their cargo, their gear, and one
9 carrying 150 members of these two teams.

10 And their capacity, what they essentially
11 bring are dogs. Cameras -- so they can do initial
12 search and rescue operations. They have heavy lift
13 specialists so they can move heavy concrete and the
14 like. There's significant medical capacity on these
15 teams from doctors, MDs, to virtually -- probably 80
16 percent of the team are licensed emergency medical
17 technicians. There are civil engineers on the team so,
18 as they go through a devastated area, they can look at
19 a buildings and assess their capability to, to have
20 occupancy, or if they need to be torn down immediately
21 because they pose a significant threat.

22 I should also add that these teams are, are
23 coming with a capacity with water rescue. That means
24 that they have eight boats. We know that a number of
25 people were trapped from the tsunami that struck after

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1 the quake. And so, and we also know from our experience
2 in, in responding the floods and other like events that
3 people can survive quite a long time if they're
4 fortunate enough to be in an area, in a home or
5 something, where there's, there's other resources
6 available.

7 So we expect right now that the window for
8 the earthquake search and rescue operation is about 10
9 days from the event, the date of the event, and the
10 swiftwater rescue could extend out weeks, depending on
11 the circumstances we find on the ground.

12 And as I mentioned earlier, in addition to
13 the Urban Search and Rescue teams, we do have, it's now
14 a 10-member disaster assistance response team. Some
15 members are already on the ground and operational in
16 Japan, and others are en route. And we'll be updating
17 you on that as we go forward.

18 Now, of course, there's a lot of interest
19 on the part of Americans on how to help respond to this,
20 this terrible disaster, and we are encouraging that cash
21 donations should be made. It's the quickest way to
22 effect assistance, and it also helps to, frankly, not
23 clog pipelines. There's so much international
24 attention on this right now, there's a lot of assistance
25 going into Japan.

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1 We have been in discussions with FEMA and
2 HHS about other response capabilities, other USAR
3 teams, DMAT teams, which are physicians. And we've
4 been advised by the Government of Japan that at this
5 point, there's no call for them, and we don't want overly
6 complicate the response. We're holding back on, on
7 that element at the moment.

8 And on the donations front, in addition to
9 messaging that, that we urge people if they do want to
10 help, to send cash, we're directing them to
11 www.interaction.org. Interaction is an umbrella
12 organization based here in Washington that has hundreds
13 of NGOs that operate, are members. And they also have
14 links to Japanese NGOs, non-governmental
15 organizations, that are on this portal when you, when
16 you click on that website, www.interaction.org. And
17 also, the American Red Cross has established operations
18 to receive donations through text messages.
19 Individuals can contribute by texting Red Cross to
20 90999.

21 That's a, the very brief summary, and I'm
22 happy to take questions.

23 RICK KESSLER: This is Rick Kessler.

24 There was one report -- and I know you said
25 you, you gave it at the DET -- there was one Japanese

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1 report of 9,500 missing in one prefecture. Do you have
2 any other additional information? You probably don't,
3 but --

4 MARK BARTOLINI: We, we don't, right now.
5 I do know that there are other estimates out there. The
6 media, the local media is producing different
7 estimates. We're right now going with the Government's
8 projection.

9 RICK KESSLER: And on the, on the nuclear
10 front, do you have any other independent confirmation
11 of any radioactive release?

12 MARK BARTOLINI: We don't at this point.

13 RICK KESSLER: I assume that there was,
14 given the location of the plant and the prevailing
15 winds, it would be headed our way.

16 MARK BARTOLINI: Well, what we know is that
17 the winds are offshore and that the plant has been
18 evacuated; I believe it's a 10- to 20-kilometer radius.

19 RICK KESSLER: Okay.

20 DIANA OHLBAUM: This is Diane
21 Ohlbaum -- just a few technical questions.

22 First of all, the search and rescue teams,
23 is it LA and Fairfax?

24 MARK BARTOLINI: That's correct; it's LA
25 and Fairfax.

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1 DIANA OHLBAUM: Okay. And you don't know
2 how, how many from each, do you?

3 MARK BARTOLINI: It's, I believe, 72 from
4 LA --

5 DIANA OHLBAUM: Uh-huh.

6 MARK BARTOLINI: -- and there's 350, so the
7 other -- I'm terrible at math -- the other is 78.

8 FEMALE PARTICIPANT: It's 72 to 74.

9 MARK BARTOLINI: Yeah, it's about 72 to 74
10 per team, but I think one has a couple of other members.

11 DIANA OHLBAUM: Okay.

12 Also, you know, during the Pakistan
13 emergency, you know, the State Department had set up a
14 number where you could call from your cell phone and
15 automatically donate \$10 or something like that. Are
16 you going to be doing something like that again?

17 MALE PARTICIPANT: No, we're not
18 anticipating doing anything like that at this point.

19 DIANA OHLBAUM: Okay, and I anticipate
20 getting some questions from people about, you know, even
21 though this is a terrible emergency, you know, Japan is
22 a fairly wealthy country.

23 And so can you explain what the, the costs
24 are to us in, in mounting the team and the responses?
25 Is this paying the salaries for the search-and-rescue

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1 teams and equipment? Or, you know, how much do you
2 expect it to cost, and what would that be?

3 MARK BARTOLINI: Well, it's, it's too
4 early to speculate what our final costs will be. I can
5 say that already, we have dedicated \$1 million towards
6 the response.

7 DIANA OHLBAUM: Um-hmm.

8 MALE PARTICIPANT: And I should also
9 stress that the decision to send these two teams was
10 based on a request by the Government of Japan.

11 DIANA OHLBAUM: Okay. And, and when you
12 send these teams --

13 MARK BARTOLINI: We are paying for --

14 DIANA OHLBAUM: You, you pay for their
15 transportation and the salaries and stuff.

16 MARK BARTOLINI: That's correct; we pay
17 their salaries, and transportation for both the, the
18 personnel, obviously, and equipment.

19 DIANA OHLBAUM: Okay.

20 RICK KESSLER: Do you have any figures on
21 how much, how many Japanese now are still without power?
22 I heard an earlier figure of six million, but I don't,
23 I don't know if you have any information from the
24 Japanese on it.

25 MARK BARTOLINI: Yeah, you know, we're

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1 hearing that range, but I have not heard more specific
2 information.

3 RICK KESSLER: You -- I'm sorry; I've been
4 talking over you. Could you repeat that?

5 MARK BARTOLINI: Yeah. I just was saying
6 that I have not heard any other information about that.
7 I think that's about what we're hearing.

8 RICK KESSLER: Okay, and how about -- do
9 you have any, any indications of how much
10 infrastructure, transportation, is back online in other
11 parts of the country that weren't at the epicenter?

12 MARK BARTOLINI: I'm afraid I can't answer
13 that either.

14 I just, our teams right now are going into,
15 obviously, the affected areas, and --

16 RICK KESSLER: Right.

17 MARK BARTOLINI: -- certainly, there are
18 numerous problems there. It's very difficult to get
19 around in, in the most affected areas.

20 RICK KESSLER: Um-hmm.

21 DIANA OHLBAUM: Do you have any
22 information on our military's response? Is, is there
23 any other request that they've made of us besides what
24 you said you've already done?

25 MALE PARTICIPANT: Well, in terms of

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1 what -- USAID has been cooperating with DOD. They've
2 been helping us lift these teams into the region. We
3 flew our, our passengers -- or not passengers -- but our
4 team members commercial. But we're flying are gear
5 through DOD.

6 And we're also coordinating with DOD, so
7 once they arrive, they're going to help give us lifts
8 so we get to the most impacted areas as quickly as
9 possible.

10 Lift --

11 MALE PARTICIPANT: Go ahead.

12 MARK BARTOLINI: Yeah, I was just saying,
13 both helicopters and trucks were looking to receive
14 support once we're on the ground.

15 RICK KESSLER: I forget how far away the
16 nearest American base is.

17 MARK BARTOLINI: Well, there's a lot of
18 bases out there. And I do know that they're, the DOD
19 is, is very involved with this and, through their
20 Japanese counterparts.

21 I can't give you any other specifics other
22 than what we're doing with them.

23 DIANA OHLBAUM: Will you be able to get
24 them in on one of the future phone calls, or -- you know,
25 what's the coordination with them? Or is that all just

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1 out in the field?

2 MARK BARTOLINI: Well, it's out in the
3 field, but we also have a member here on our response
4 management team. And I, I just don't know what he'd be
5 able to give you beyond what we're doing with DOD, and
6 from USAID's perspective.

7 I, I think you'd have to go to DOD to get
8 a broader --

9 BETTE COOK: We'll, we'll work on that,
10 Diana, and see if we can't get some help get some
11 information for you.

12 DIANA OHLBAUM: Okay, that would be great.
13 And are there any outstanding requests for
14 assistance from the Japanese government to us that we
15 haven't --

16 MARK BARTOLINI: Not that we're aware of,
17 on the humanitarian side.

18 RICK KESSLER: The tsunami -- was there any
19 damage in the islands when it headed south through Latin
20 America? Was that going to hit? Were there any
21 reports of that, or no?

22 MARK BARTOLINI: No, we've not received
23 reports of that, and we, we did have teams monitoring
24 throughout the Pacific.

25 As you know, California had some damage;

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1 Oregon. But we understand that FEMA has that well
2 within its, its operational capabilities.

3 MARY BETH SCHULTZ: Hi, this is Mary Beth
4 Schultz from the Senate Homeland Security Committee.

5 I was just wondering, do you have any ideas
6 of what additional, if any, resources or what else are
7 we doing over the next couple weeks to help out with this
8 crisis?

9 MARK BARTOLINI: Well, as I said earlier,
10 I think, given the nature of the crisis, I think our USAR
11 teams will be active for at least two weeks, and it well
12 could be longer in some of the tsunami-impacted areas.

13 And then we're really -- it's very early
14 days out there -- so we're going to assess the situation.
15 We really are in the, we just have teams getting on the
16 ground, as I said, doing an assessment.

17 So, as conditions -- the situational
18 awareness evolves, I'll be able to have better answer
19 that question, but we're, of course, going to try to be
20 as responsive as possible to any specific requests from
21 the Japanese government.

22 MARY BETH SCHULTZ: Okay, and are you -- I
23 don't know if this is your role or not -- but do you do
24 anything to help coordinate any of the nonprofits that
25 might be going in to assist? Or do you, what kind of

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1 interaction do you have with them?

2 MARK BARTOLINI: Well, our primary
3 interaction on that front is that we fund the United
4 Nations Operation and Coordination of Humanitarian
5 Assistance, UN OCHA. And at this point, and think it's
6 too early to say whether there's going to be a
7 significant international NGO component here.

8 Again, it's very developed country. They
9 have a lot of resources, and there isn't a lot of
10 international NGO activity, as I understand it, in
11 Japan. There are a lot of local NGOs, and that website
12 I gave you earlier, I know they're receiving -- that's
13 been coordinated through Interaction, where they're
14 receiving donations for the humanitarian efforts.

15 MARY BETH SCHULTZ: Okay, thank you.

16 DENNIS: This is Dennis from Foreign
17 Affairs.

18 I was wondering, this morning when I saw the
19 list of Asia-Pacific countries providing assistance,
20 like South Korea, Singapore, Australia, and New
21 Zealand, have you heard of any assistance coming from
22 the Chinese government?

23 MARK BARTOLINI: I, I haven't, which
24 really doesn't mean that it hasn't occurred. I, I did
25 see the same -- probably -- report you saw.

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1 We know that there's a significant amount
2 of interactional response.

3 DENNIS: And I also saw the report, no US
4 citizen casualties. But do you know, are there any US
5 citizens missing?

6 MARK BARTOLINI: I do believe there are
7 some US citizens that are unaccounted for. That's,
8 that's a question for State. But I have heard through
9 reports that there are some.

10 KAREN GATZ: Dennis, this is Karen. I'll
11 check with our Consular Affairs on missing. I have no
12 information on that right at the moment.

13 DENNIS: Thank you.

14 KAREN GATZ: Sure.

15 BETTE COOK: Any other questions?

16 MARK BARTOLINI: Thank you, Betty.

17 BETTE COOK: Well, we have, we've heard
18 your questions. We'll try to get a little more
19 information to you.

20 As Mark said, it's very early in the
21 process. We just got our teams on the ground, and we
22 will be getting better information down the line that
23 we can share with you.

24 And I really, thank you so much for joining
25 us today.

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1 KAREN GATZ: And thank you for doing this.

2 BETTE COOK: I hope you come back tomorrow.

3 FEMALE PARTICIPANT: Thank you very much.

4 BETTE COOK: Thank you.

25 JACK RAMSEY: Sure.

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[LONG PAUSE.]

JEFF TEMPLE: Do you know if the JANUS guys
picked up the data from here?

BROOKE POOLE: No.

JEFF TEMPLE: Jack Ramsey's on the phone.

BROOKE POOLE: Okay.

JEFF TEMPLE: They have not picked up
the --

JACK RAMSEY: Would, would, would they
like for me to call them?

JEFF TEMPLE: I've got Jack Ramsay on the
phone.

Hold on. This is Brooke.

BROOKE POOLE: I need to --

JEFF TEMPLE: Yes.

BROOKE POOLE: Hey, Jack.

JACK RAMSEY: Hey,

BROOKE POOLE:

BROOKE POOLE: Yeah.

JACK RAMSEY: Has the guy from JANUS come
out yet?

BROOKE POOLE: No.

15 is willing to provide.

16 And you know, we, other than general
17 guidance, we don't, you know, we've provided them
18 background information, but we don't have any -- there
19 have been some specific requests for assistance to the
20 US government separately, different channels, but
21 not --

22 JACK RAMSEY: Not, not through that

23 JANICE: Not through specific requests,
24 and so we're kind of -- but I don't know that we want
25 to really get tied down by formalities.

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1 JACK RAMSEY: Yeah, that's, that's true.

2 JANICE: You know, I mean, and, and so, so
3 we're hoping that they will come out here,
4 [indiscernible] Yamachica (phonetic).

5 JACK RAMSEY: Yeah, and Chinworth.

6 JANICE: Yeah, yeah -- and, right.

7 JACK RAMSEY: Yeah, would it help if I
8 called Chinworth? And I know this guy really well.

9 JANICE: Yeah.

10 JACK RAMSEY: And if I call, if I call him
11 and tell them it's important, okay, I'm 90-percent
12 certain they'll be out there as quick as they can.

13 JANICE: Yeah, I, I had the feeling
14 it's -- I mean it's, you know, we don't want to offend
15 one another, and, and yet we want to be honest and, you
16 know, if they can't, for whatever their -- they, they
17 wanted to bring Tepco, but I said, no; I don't, I think
18 regulator-to-regulator is the first step, so.

19 JACK RAMSEY: Yeah, I mean unless Tepco's
20 got some data they can share or something like that.

21 Did you tell them that you're actually
22 trying to give them some radiation monitoring data?

23 JANICE: No. No, because I, I thought we
24 were sending it out through the Embassy. Brooke has
25 been working on that issue.

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1 JACK RAMSEY: Is that something we want to
2 get them?

3 JANICE: We could probably -- I don't
4 know -- I thought we were sending it to the Embassy.
5 I'll have to follow up, but I didn't, I thought we
6 were -- and I think she, she may have already sent it
7 through a separate channel. But we could give it to
8 them, too, I guess, just it's not --

9 JACK RAMSEY: Okay.

10 JANICE: Because I thought that -- first,
11 I heard that we were against, you know, that we didn't
12 want to get out ahead of others, and you know, I think
13 we did have that, but.

14 JACK RAMSEY: Okay, yeah, because here's
15 what I'm scratching my head over. I mean I was talking
16 to Mike Chinworth last night in a couple of things. (b)(5)

12 came through here and grabbed the phone, but I don't
13 see him now. I'm looking around; there's about 100
14 people in this room, and I don't see him. I'm sorry
15 about that.

16 Maybe if you can shoot them an email if
17 you have email --

18 NANCY FRAGOYANNIS: I already did that.

19 MAJOR MOSLEY: You did.

20 NANCY FRAGOYANNIS: I did that about an
21 hour ago.

22 MAJOR MOSLEY: Okay. All right.

23 NANCY FRAGOYANNIS: And we left an email
24 for him to call us in our ops office, and --

25 MAJOR MOSLEY: Okay.

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1 NANCY FRAGOYANNIS: I'm sorry, but this
2 is -- obviously, everybody thinks theirs is important,
3 but this is important.

16 MAJOR MOSLEY: Okey-doke. All right.
17 I'm sorry about that, ma'am.

TIM RILEY: Good morning. This is Tim Riley.

SPIROS DROGGITIS: Good morning, Tim. This is Spiros.

TIM RILEY: Hey, Spiros.

SPIROS DROGGITIS: How are you?

TIM RILEY: I'm sorry. You called and then I --

SPIROS DROGGITIS: Oh, by the way, this is a recorded line.

TIM RILEY: Thank you.

SPIROS DROGGITIS: My cell phone is down to --

TIM RILEY: Nothing.

SPIROS DROGGITIS: A couple of bars, yeah. I'm trying to conserve that.

TIM RILEY: Okay.

SPIROS DROGGITIS: Sorry about the mix-up on the phone numbers. It never dawned on -- well, I thought I made it clear when we set up the bridge line that it was through the weekend, but I guess maybe --

TIM RILEY: Yeah.

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1 SPIROS DROGGITIS: -- I didn't or Verizon
2 didn't understand that or what.

3 TIM RILEY: No worries.

4 SPIROS DROGGITIS: But great on recovering
5 that.

6 SPIROS DROGGITIS: But, but great on
7 recovering that.

8 And I gather, looking at what Ray Ann said,
9 that maybe she didn't know that they had changed the
10 number.

11 TIM RILEY: Well, I had sent it out. I had
12 cc'ed her --

13 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Yeah.

14 TIM RILEY: -- on the invite.

15 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Yeah.

16 TIM RILEY: But I didn't send it to her
17 specifically. I sent it to Eric Leeds and you.

18 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Uh-huh.

19 TIM RILEY: But I had forgot to --

20 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Ah.

21 TIM RILEY: I, I meant to send it to Becky
22 and Ray Ann, as well --

23 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Yeah.

24 TIM RILEY: -- the call-in numbers, so.

25 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Yep. Okay, well --

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1 TIM RILEY: She could have called in, and
2 if I had just sent, it would have been all the same,
3 but --

4 SPIROS DROGGITIS: That's not a -- I mean
5 these things happen.

6 But I, I guess the two calls went well,
7 although, now, I understand there is a little concern
8 that Eric's effort to get people that are better versed
9 are pulling them away from their important duties over
10 at the reactor team and the --

11 TIM RILEY: Oh, really?

12 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Yeah -- so we may be
13 back to a higher level, which people aren't going to find
14 very --

15 TIM RILEY: Right.

16 SPIROS DROGGITIS: -- Satisfying. But I
17 guess we'll do the, make the best we can.

18 Speaking of that, now, I'm wondering
19 if -- well, a couple things.

20 Amy noticed that on our website, they put
21 out a press release announcing that the seismic
22 information was now posted on our NRC actions Japan's
23 emergency. If you look at the NRC post, updated seismic
24 questions and answers. But I think that was done on
25 Saturday out of here, so it didn't go through the normal

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1 process where they send an advance copy.

2 TIM RILEY: Right.

3 SPIROS DROGGITIS: So we never got that
4 out. I'm wondering if you or Nancy or Jeanette or
5 somebody could --

6 TIM RILEY: Push that over to, over there.

7 SPIROS DROGGITIS: -- push that out, yeah.

8 TIM RILEY: Okay.

9 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Okay? And I'm
10 wondering what, what's you're thinking as to whether we
11 should do another reminder on the call with the -- we're
12 going to be back now to the original, not -- was
13 yesterday's and Ops Center call as well?

14 TIM RILEY: It was.

15 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Okay. Now the Ops
16 Center calls, are they more free-wheeling? In other
17 words, can people interrupt and ask questions?

18 TIM RILEY: Yes, because the way that we
19 had it set up -- well, at least the way I did it -- we,
20 we, you know, I didn't have someone be the call later.

21 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Right.

22 TIM RILEY: So I couldn't mute everyone.

23 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Right.

24 TIM RILEY: I had to remind people because
25 I could hear somebody munching, and somebody --

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1 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Right. Right.

2 TIM RILEY: -- and someone typing, you
3 know.

4 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Now let me ask you,
5 though, was it, did it work okay, though?

6 TIM RILEY: Yeah, it did.

7 SPIROS DROGGITIS: People -- yeah, because
8 I'm afraid that we're going to go back to the old system,
9 which is, you know, the speaker controls it, and saving
10 questions until after --

11 TIM RILEY: Raise your hand, and we will
12 get to you.

13 SPIROS DROGGITIS: And people may grumble
14 over that.

15 TIM RILEY: Yeah, you know, I, my personal
16 opinion was that Saturday's call went very well because
17 Bruce and Dawn both engaged and provided follow-up and
18 frank discussion, and, and then -- if that makes
19 sense -- and then Neehall (phonetic) could come back and
20 say, do I understand this right?

21 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Right.

22 TIM RILEY: They could jump right back in,
23 instead of the --

24 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Yeah, I don't know if
25 we're going to be able to reach adjust, aiming to --

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1 TIM RILEY: Yeah.

2 SPIROS DROGGITIS: I think the, the way the
3 Verizon calls are set up, for some reason, is that the
4 leader gets to speak, and then they open it up later.
5 I don't know if you can change that, but I guess we'll
6 deal with that.

7 But I'm wondering whether we need to send
8 another, you know, reminder --

9 TIM RILEY: I am of the view that it's less
10 confusing. I will also tell you that I imagine that
11 people are getting annoyed with the, the volume of
12 emails that are sending out for me. And at least two
13 people have told me that it's going into their spam
14 folder because of the large number of recipients.

15 So, you know, their, their computer
16 automatically marks it as spam.

17 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Yeah. Well, okay, so
18 do they want the information, or don't they want the
19 information?

20 TIM RILEY: Right. Right.

21 SPIROS DROGGITIS: You know, you know, you
22 can't have it both ways.

23 TIM RILEY: Right.

24 SPIROS DROGGITIS: So I think we should
25 just do what we're doing --

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1 TIM RILEY: Right.

2 SPIROS DROGGITIS: -- and let them -- they
3 can always hit delete; right?

4 TIM RILEY: So --

5 SPIROS DROGGITIS: -- market is not spam,
6 or --

7 TIM RILEY: How about I go ahead and I send
8 out a notice for this morning because of the three
9 o'clock call, but it says that for the rest of the week --

10 SPIROS DROGGITIS: And for the rest of the
11 week, right, it's going to be --

12 TIM RILEY: -- through Friday, we'll be on
13 the [indiscernible].

14 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Right. Would you mind
15 doing that?

16 TIM RILEY: No.

17 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Okay. That would be
18 great.

19 Okay, so the calls have been, it's back to
20 our oversight people. You know, it's less now the
21 members; right?

22 TIM RILEY: Well, I guess I took it to
23 understand that Senator Durbin was, was, Senator
24 Durbin's office was on the call on Saturday.

25 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Um-hmm.

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1 TIM RILEY: And I took it to, I
2 also -- Representative Kucinich said that, you know,
3 his, his staffer said that he was going to be on the
4 call --

5 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Okay.

6 TIM RILEY: -- maybe this weekend, but
7 definitely on Monday.

8 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Okay. Yeah, looking
9 at Ray Ann' little write-up -- I don't know she forwarded
10 that, she forwarded that to everybody --

11 TIM RILEY: Yes.

12 SPIROS DROGGITIS: It had Mark E. Hoyer,
13 EPW Lieberman, and it looks like somebody else. So
14 there are, that is a little broader than sort of who we
15 normally deal with, so I guess we, we should send that
16 around to the larger distribution, and they can choose.

17 TIM RILEY: Should I say anything about
18 last email, this will be the last email notice? Famous
19 last words, but --

20 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Never say "never."

21 TIM RILEY: Yeah.

22 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Although, you may want
23 to, you could, you may be able to combine and, and just,
24 you know, send the reminder about the call and then say,
25 in addition, I just want you to note that we've -- and

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1 then just pull that press release from, on the seismic
2 stuff.

3 TIM RILEY: Okay.

4 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Okay? Now, did Bruce
5 or anybody mention that we now have this link on our
6 website?

7 TIM RILEY: I did, yes.

8 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Uh-huh, okay.

10 that out.

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1 DAVID MOSS: Hello?

2 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Dave Moss, please?

3 DAVID MOSS: Yes, sir.

4 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Hi. This is Spiros
5 Droggitis. First of all, I'm calling from the NRC
6 Operations Center, so I should tell you that this is a
7 recorded line, since we're dealing with this emergency
8 in Japan.

9 DAVID MOSS: Okay.

10 SPIROS DROGGITIS: I'm in the Office of
11 Congressional Affairs, and over the last week or so,
12 several congressmen or senators have been contacted by
13 constituents, mainly, you know, companies that claim
14 that they have some expertise in certain areas that they
15 could may be able to help the situation in Japan.

16 And I was over at our reactor protection
17 team, and we were wondering -- I don't want to dump
18 something on you guys -- but is this something that if
19 we get an email that has somebody that says 'I can do
20 this'-- there was one robot technology; some other guy
21 said he lived in Singapore and he was a GD engineer
22 helping the --

23 DAVID MOSS: Um-hmm.

24 SPIROS DROGGITIS: -- you know, the design
25 of the Fukushima plant, and he stands ready to help out.

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1 I mean --

2 DAVID MOSS: We have a team -- I'm sorry --
3 we have a team assembled now with the -- I don't know
4 that the 24 hours a day --

5 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Yeah.

6 DAVID MOSS: But maybe 18 or 20 hours a day.
7 But they're collecting just that kind of information --

8 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Can you --

9 DAVID MOSS: -- but typically from the US
10 nuclear industry.

11 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Right. Right.

12 DAVID MOSS: And that's been the extent of
13 it so far.

14 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Right.

15 DAVID MOSS: If you wanted to extend it
16 beyond that, we can engage in a dialogue about that.
17 But as of right now, we're, we are trying to collect up
18 what resources are available in the US nuclear industry
19 that could be of use.

20 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Yeah. Well --

21 DAVID MOSS: -- whether it's technical
22 guidance or hardware or people.

23 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Right. Right. I mean
24 the email I was given over at our reactor protection team
25 was INPO.ERC@INPO.org. Is that -- I mean, is this

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1 something I can forward and then you guys could consider
2 it, you know --

3 DAVID MOSS: Yeah. That's, that's
4 probably a good idea, and maybe engage in some dialogue
5 about what the limits of that would be. I don't know,
6 but if you could send it to that email address.

7 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Yeah, okay.

8 DAVID MOSS: -- and send it to my personal
9 email, my work email address.

10 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Okay.

11 DAVID MOSS: I can go get involved in some
12 discussions to try to jumpstart that.

13 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Okay.

14 DAVID MOSS: And my email address:
15 MossDJ, M-O-S-S, D-J -- David Johnson --

16 SPIROS DROGGITIS: DJ, okay.

17 DAVID MOSS: Yeah -- @INPO.org.

18 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Okay.

19 DAVID MOSS: And let me get your name and
20 number.

21 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Yeah, my first name is
22 Spiros, S-P-I-R-O-S --

23 DAVID MOSS: Okay.

24 SPIROS DROGGITIS: -- and last name is
25 Droggitis, D-R-O-G-G-I-T-I-S. I'm calling you from

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1 our operation center, but why don't I give you my office
2 number, you know, if you want it.

3 DAVID MOSS: Okay.

4 SPIROS DROGGITIS: It's 301 --

5 DAVID MOSS: Okay.

6 SPIROS DROGGITIS: -- 415-1777.

7 DAVID MOSS: It's 415?

8 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Yeah. Yeah.

9 DAVID MOSS: one-seven-seven-seven.

10 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Yeah. Yeah. And like
11 I said, we're just Congressional Affairs, but you know,
12 it, I'm sure these are, you know, well-intended people
13 that have, you know, capabilities out there, that
14 they're just contacting their senators or congressmen
15 saying, I stand ready to help.

16 But you know, there are -- like Senator
17 Snowe from Maine sent something; Senator Sheheen from
18 New Hampshire.

19 DAVID MOSS: Um-hmm.

20 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Now, I -- oh, Cornyn
21 from Texas. So these are the emails we've received.

22 Now Senator Feinstein's office from
23 California had heard about the INPO having the ability
24 to sort of have an inventory out there of various
25 equipment that would be, you know, as I understand it,

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1 mainly for domestic uses.

2 DAVID MOSS: Right.

3 SPIROS DROGGITIS: And I told him that INPO
4 had this program, you know, confirmed that they had the
5 program, and that we really didn't have a role in that,
6 because he was wondering whether the NRC had a, had a
7 responsibility with that. And I said no.

8 He responded back this morning and thanked
9 me, and he wanted to know if he could follow up a bit
10 with somebody at INPO. Would you mind if I passed his
11 name on to you -- or your name onto him -- excuse me.

12 DAVID MOSS: I, I --

13 SPIROS DROGGITIS: -- what's that?

14 DAVID MOSS: I'm sorry --

15 SPIROS DROGGITIS: -- we have, we have
16 another group that would probably be the best one to
17 talk, but I'll be glad to be the intermediary for that.

18 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Well, yeah, I don't
19 want to burden you if you want to give me a number, or
20 I could just -- you know the context.

21 DAVID MOSS: Right, but this is looking for
22 coordinating assistance; right?

23 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Yeah. Yeah.

24 DAVID MOSS: And I, I have a name, but I
25 don't have his number.

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1 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Okay. Well --

2 DAVID MOSS: Maybe if, you, you have a
3 number, I could have our guy call Jim Lynch. If you have
4 a number, he can call. I can make that happen in, in
5 the next 30 minutes or so.

6 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Yeah. I have his --
7 how about if I forward his email to you?

8 DAVID MOSS: Okay.

9 SPIROS DROGGITIS: And his name is Adam
10 Christensen, and he's, like say, with Senator Feinstein
11 from California.

12 DAVID MOSS: Okay.

13 SPIROS DROGGITIS: And he's the one that's
14 just looking for somebody from INPO to talk to about
15 this. And then the other four that I'm going to forward
16 are the suggestions from various, you know, senators'
17 offices, from their constituents.

18 DAVID MOSS: Okay.

19 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Okay? So I will --
20 now, just to make clear, you want me to send it both to
21 you and to that INPO.ERC, or just to you initially, just
22 to --

23 DAVID MOSS: Actually, send it to both.

24 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Okay.

25 DAVID MOSS: The INPO ERC mailbox is

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1 available to a wide variety of people as we change over
2 shifts.

3 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Um-hmm.

4 DAVID MOSS: But if I have a copy of it
5 myself today, I'm not in the Emergency Response Center
6 today --

7 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Yes.

8 DAVID MOSS: -- but I'm, I'm at work today.

9 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Right.

10 DAVID MOSS: So if you send it to me, I can
11 walk around and find the right people and get the right
12 person to respond.

13 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Okay. Great. Great.

14 DAVID MOSS: Yeah.

15 SPIROS DROGGITIS: And like I say, you
16 know, we just don't want them to sit here because, as
17 you understand, our --

18 DAVID MOSS: Right.

19 SPIROS DROGGITIS: -- our ability to do any
20 follow-up with this sort of thing is kind of limited,
21 and, and I hate for people to think that, you know, we're
22 not being responsive or, you know, that it's not being
23 considered.

24 DAVID MOSS: Right.

25 SPIROS DROGGITIS: And maybe these things

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1 aren't, you know, what's needed, but at least we're, you
2 know, forwarding it on to some people that hopefully can
3 analyze it.

4 DAVID MOSS: Yeah. We have quite a bit of
5 infrastructure to support.

6 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Yeah.

7 DAVID MOSS: You know, we would know
8 exactly what to do if it was in the US.

9 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Um-hmm. Right.

10 DAVID MOSS: We're sort of, we see the
11 need. We see there's probably some, some role to play.

12 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Right.

13 DAVID MOSS: But we're figuring out what
14 the protocols are as we go, and this is, this is a new
15 twist. I haven't heard this one yet.

16 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Yes.

17 DAVID MOSS: That sort of, the resource is
18 not directly involved in the nuclear industry, who may
19 have expertise to help.

20 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Right. Exactly.
21 Okay.

22 DAVID MOSS: Okay.

23 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Dave, I appreciate your
24 help. I will get these off to you, and you have my
25 office number. Like say, I'm at our ERC now, but I'll

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1 be back at the office this afternoon.

2 DAVID MOSS: Okay.

3 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Okay? And you'll be,
4 and I'll be, you'll be getting this from my email
5 account, not the, the Operations Center email, so you'll
6 have my personal email.

7 DAVID MOSS: Okay.

8 SPIROS DROGGITIS: Okay? Great.

9 Thanks, Dave. Bye.

10 DAVID MOSS: Bye.

12 SPIROS DROGGITIS: -- that you were on a
13 conference call with Brian, and he mentioned some
14 readings in Washington State that I -- wasn't it DOE?

15 The other thing -- let's just look at one
16 more thing, our -- let's see. You know, our website
17 now, let's look at Energy. No, that's old information
18 from the 18th -- somewhere between March 16 and 17, a
19 detector at the Department of Energy, specifically,
20 Northwest lab in Washington State, detected trace
21 amounts of xenon 133, which is a radioactive noble gas,
22 during fissions. Was that it?

23 TIM RILEY: Yeah. When, when is that
24 from?

25 SPIROS DROGGITIS: That's from the 18th.

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1 That's from DOE's website. If you look at our website
2 on Japan, and you go scroll down, and it's got the
3 various agencies --

5 SPIROS DROGGITIS: -- click DOE at the
6 bottom right, right at the bottom there.

20 well, what happens if stuff starts coming here and we
21 only have a two-day supply, so that's why we have to a

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1 this -- I, I didn't talk to this congressional staffer,
