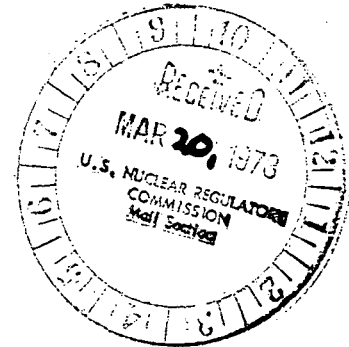
With regard to your letter of February 17, 1978 concerning the NRC's automated mailing system, the address currently used on correspondence to Duke Power Company is correct. With regard to the use of an automated mailing system by the NRC, there have been no serious problems experienced with the system, however, the following observation is made relating to the system's performance. Letters mailed specifically to Duke Power take less than a week to be received from the date of the letter, while those to an addressee group utilizing the automated system require one to two weeks to be received. For items that require a licensee's response based on the date of the letter, this can make a significant difference in the time available for response. It is therefore recommended that the time allowed for a licensee to respond to a letter take into account the apparent processing time delay within the NRC request (e.g., responses based on date of receipt). In this manner, the authorized time to respond will not be unduly shortened by automated system delays.
