

Re: Turkey Point Units 3 and 4
Docket Nos. 50-250 and 50-251
Enforcement Action 86-20

This will confirm our telephone conversation of August 25, 1986, in which I requested an extension of time to October 1, 1986, to respond to the subject enforcement action.

FPL, as you have noted, has already initiated an extensive corrective action program to meet many of the deficiencies identified in the Notice of Violation. We share your view that these measures are necessary to improve operations at the Turkey Point facilities; this is among our highest corporate priorities. The subject enforcement action requires careful review and analysis to assure that root causes have been clearly identified and that our corrective actions completely correlate with those causes. It was for this reason that the extension request was made. We believe it would be in our mutual interest in improving performance at Turkey Point to allow an additional period for study and response to EA-86-20.

We appreciate your cooperation in this matter.
