Dear Dr. Chae:

Enclosed is Amendment No. 14 to your Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) Materials License No. 21-26287-01 in accordance with your request.

In correspondence dated September 25, 2017, you indicated that you wish to remove and release the facility at 601 N. Main St., Rochester, Michigan for unrestricted use.

The NRC staff has reviewed your final status surveys. Based on its review, the staff has concluded that all licensable radioactive material has been removed from the location of use and residual radioactive material attributable to licensed activities does not exceed current NRC criteria. Based on these conclusions no further remediation or actions with respect to NRC regulated material is required for this area of use and it is suitable for unrestricted use.

Please note that your license format has changed in accordance with our new licensing process system. License Condition No. 13 has been removed in line with current NRC practices. License Condition No. 14 has been deleted in accordance with current NRC policy to include the reference to Title 10 of the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR), Part 71, "Packaging and Transportation of Radioactive Material," in the preamble, on page 1 of the license.

Finally, we have added NRC's Agencywide Documents Access and Management System (ADAMS) document accession numbers to the documents referenced in the last condition to the amended license.

Please review the enclosed document carefully and be sure that you understand all conditions. If there are any errors or questions, please notify the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission, Region III office at (630) 829-9887 so that we can provide appropriate corrections and answers.


You will be periodically inspected by NRC. Failure to conduct your program in accordance with NRC regulations, license conditions, and representations made in your license application and supplemental correspondence with NRC will result in enforcement action against you. This could include issuance of a notice of violation, or imposition of a civil penalty, or an order suspending, modifying or revoking your license as specified in the General Statement of Policy and Procedure for NRC Enforcement Actions.

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The NRC's Safety Culture Policy Statement became effective in June 2011. While a policy statement and not a regulation, it sets forth the agency's *expectations* for individuals and organizations to establish and maintain a positive safety culture.
