The NRC's mission is to ensure adequate protection of the public health and safety; as such, the protection of the people near the facility is essential to our agency mission. Consistent with that mission, the NRC will not issue a license for a CISF unless and until the NRC staff has completed a detailed safety, security, and environmental review, and the applicant is able to demonstrate that the facility can meet all applicable NRC regulations and statutory requirements, including the Atomic Energy Act of 1954, as amended.

In accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (NEPA) and the NRC's regulations in Part 51 of Title 10 of the *Code of Federal Regulations* (10 CFR) Part 51, the NRC is required to conduct a comprehensive evaluation of the potential environmental impacts from the construction and operation of the CISF, and publish the results of its review in an environmental impact statement (EIS).

The NRC has an established regulatory process for developing EISs consistent with its principles of good regulation, which include openness and transparency in the conduct of licensing activities. Our process provides opportunities for the public to comment and participate in various elements of the environmental review process. The first opportunity for public involvement and input is during the scoping period, as the NRC staff solicits external stakeholder input on the matters identified in 10 CFR 51.29, including the issues to be analyzed in depth during the agency's environmental review.

The NRC started the scoping period on March 30, 2018. Scoping meetings provide very important input from affected and interested parties to the NRC. Since the beginning of the scoping period, the NRC has conducted a total of six scoping meetings. The first public scoping meeting was on April 25 at NRC headquarters in Rockville, MD. In an effort to reach a nationwide audience, the NRC staff transmitted the April 25, 2018, meeting via webcast and provided a moderated telephone line to allow interested parties that could not attend the meetings in person to provide oral scoping meetings in Roswell, Hobbs, and Carlsbad, N.M. Prior to each of these scoping meetings in New Mexico, the staff held open houses where NRC staff met informally with the public and answered questions regarding the NRC's role and review process for the proposed facility. In response to feedback received from the public during these scoping meetings in New Mexico, the NRC conducted two additional scoping meetings on May 21 and 22, 2018, in Gallup and Albuquerque, respectively. All of these scoping meetings were announced in the Federal Register, newspapers, radio stations, social media, and press releases to maximize public participation.

Additionally, the NRC staff has begun seeking input from federal, state, and local agencies to obtain additional information on this project. The NRC will also be consulting with Native American Tribes to identify historic properties of religious and cultural significance to them within the areas of potential effects.

The NRC has also decided to extend the scoping comment period for an additional 60 days beyond the original 60-day scoping period. The extended deadline for the comment period is July 30, 2018. Members of the public may raise matters, which they believe should be considered within the scope of the NRC staff's environmental review of the proposed facility, including those involving transportation, by submitting comments by that date. The NRC staff believes that the six scoping meetings, along with the 120-day scoping period, provides meaningful and ample opportunities for members of the public to submit their comments, while allowing the NRC to make a timely regulatory decision. Therefore, the staff is not planning to conduct additional scoping meetings or further extend the comment period.

Therefore, the staff is not planning to conduct additional scoping meetings or further extend the comment period.

Importantly, the public will have additional opportunities to participate in the NRC's environmental review process when the staff publishes the draft EIS for public comment. The NRC staff will actively seek comments on the draft EIS by conducting public meetings in the local area of the proposed facility to solicit comments on its draft report. The NRC currently estimates that it will issue the draft EIS in late summer 2019.

In accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (NEPA) and the NRC's regulations in Part 51 of Title 10 of the *Code of Federal Regulations* (10 CFR) Part 51, the NRC is required to conduct a comprehensive evaluation of the potential environmental impacts from the construction and operation of the CISF, and publish the results of its review in an environmental impact statement (EIS).

The first opportunity for public involvement and input is during the scoping period, as the NRC staff solicits external stakeholder input on the matters identified in 10 CFR 51.29, including the issues to be analyzed in depth during the agency's environmental review.

The NRC will also be consulting with Native American Tribes to identify historic properties of religious and cultural significance to them within the areas of potential effects.

The NRC has also decided to extend the scoping comment period for an additional 60 days beyond the original 60-day scoping period. The extended deadline for the comment period is July 30, 2018. Members of the public may raise matters, which they believe should be considered within the scope of the NRC staff's environmental review of the proposed facility, including those involving transportation, by submitting comments by that date. The NRC staff believes that the six scoping meetings, along with the 120-day scoping period, provides meaningful and ample opportunities for members of the public to submit their comments, while allowing the NRC to make a timely regulatory decision. Therefore, the staff is not planning to conduct additional scoping meetings or further extend the comment period.

The NRC staff will consider all of the oral comments received during the scoping meetings, as well as those received in writing, via email at Holtec-CISFEIS@nrc.gov, via mail to Ms. May Ma, Office of Administration, Mail Stop: TWFN-7-A60M, U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission, Washington DC 20555-0001, or through the online comment platform (Docket ID NRC-2018-0052 at <u>www.regulations.gov</u>). The NRC has also decided to extend the scoping comment period for an additional 60 days beyond the original 60-day scoping period. The extended deadline for the comment period is July 30, 2018. Members of the public may raise matters, which they believe should be considered within the scope of the NRC staff's environmental review of the proposed facility, including those involving transportation, by submitting comments by that date. The NRC staff believes that the six scoping meetings, along with the 120-day scoping period, provides meaningful and ample opportunities for members of the public to submit their comments, while allowing the NRC to make a timely regulatory decision. Therefore, the staff is not planning to conduct additional scoping meetings or further extend the comment period.

The NRC staff will consider all of the oral comments received during the scoping meetings, as well as those received in writing, via email at Holtec-CISFEIS@nrc.gov, via mail to Ms. May Ma, Office of Administration, Mail Stop: TWFN-7-A60M, U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission, Washington DC 20555-0001, or through the online comment platform (Docket ID NRC-2018-0052 at <u>www.regulations.gov</u>). All of the comments received will be carefully reviewed and evaluated by the staff. A scoping summary report will be issued to provide the public an opportunity to see all of the scoping comments received and how the comments were dispositioned.

The conclusion of the scoping process will not limit other meaningful opportunities for public involvement. Importantly, the public will have additional opportunities to participate in the NRC's environmental review process when the staff publishes the draft EIS for public comment. The NRC staff will actively seek comments on the draft EIS by conducting public meetings in the local area of the proposed facility to solicit comments on its draft report. The NRC currently estimates that it will issue the draft EIS in late summer 2019.

On behalf of the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC), I am responding to your letter dated May 9, 2018, requesting a 180-day extension of the scoping period and 18 additional public scoping meetings at cities likely to be near expected spent nuclear fuel transportation routes to the Holtec International's proposed Consolidated Interim Storage Facility (CISF) application.

The NRC's mission is to ensure adequate protection of the public health and safety; as such, the protection of the people near the facility is essential to our agency mission. Consistent with that mission, the NRC will not issue a license for a CISF unless and until the NRC staff has completed a detailed safety, security, and environmental review, and the applicant is able to demonstrate that the facility can meet all applicable NRC regulations and statutory requirements, including the Atomic Energy Act of 1954, as amended.

In accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (NEPA) and the NRC's regulations in Part 51 of Title 10 of the *Code of Federal Regulations* (10 CFR) Part 51, the NRC is required to conduct a comprehensive evaluation of the potential environmental impacts from the construction and operation of the CISF, and publish the results of its review in an environmental impact statement (EIS).

The NRC has an established regulatory process for developing EISs consistent with its principles of good regulation, which include openness and transparency in the conduct of licensing activities. Our process provides opportunities for the public to comment and participate in various elements of the environmental review process. The first opportunity for public involvement and input is during the scoping period, as the NRC staff solicits external stakeholder input on the matters identified in 10 CFR 51.29, including the issues to be analyzed in depth during the agency's environmental review.

The NRC started the scoping period on March 30, 2018. Scoping meetings provide very important input from affected and interested parties to the NRC. Since the beginning of the scoping period, the NRC has conducted a total of six scoping meetings. The first public scoping meeting was on April 25 at NRC headquarters in Rockville, MD. In an effort to reach a nationwide audience, the NRC staff transmitted the April 25, 2018, meeting via webcast and provided a moderated telephone line to allow interested parties that could not attend the meetings in person to provide oral scoping meetings in Roswell, Hobbs, and Carlsbad, N.M. Prior to each of these scoping meetings in New Mexico, the staff held open houses where NRC staff met informally with the public and answered questions regarding the NRC's role and review process for the proposed facility. In response to feedback received from the public during these scoping meetings in New Mexico, the NRC conducted two additional scoping meetings on May 21 and 22, 2018, in Gallup and Albuquerque, respectively. All of these scoping meetings were announced in the Federal Register, newspapers, radio stations, social media, and press releases to maximize public participation.

Additionally, the NRC staff has begun seeking input from federal, state, and local agencies to obtain additional information on this project. The NRC will also be consulting with Native American Tribes to identify historic properties of religious and cultural significance to them within the areas of potential effects.
