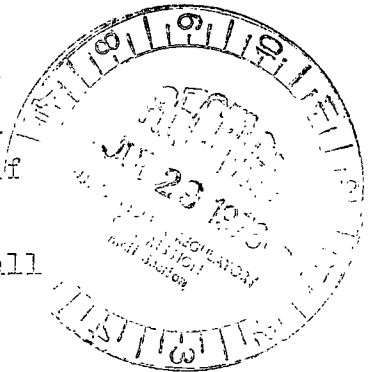

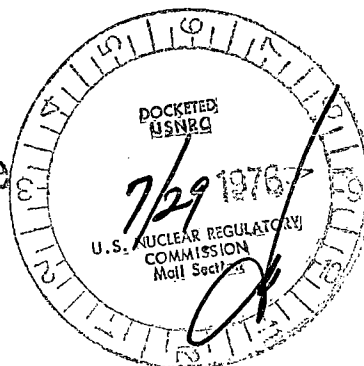

Civil defense plan available

SALEM—Copies of the Major Nuclear Facility Incidence Response Plan were made available at the regular meeting of the Salem County Board of Chosen Freeholders this week.

Director Thomas Pankok inquired about civil defense disaster control planning and obtained copies of the state plan for distribution in response to questions raised at the July 7 freeholder meeting.

Al Coleman of Pennsville had asked if any evacuation drills are planned since the nuclear plant at Artificial Island is about ready for operation.

Pankok reported on his inquiry at the board meeting Wednesday. He said that a Public Service Electric and Gas (PSE&G) spokesman reported that the company has

already conducted some "preliminary run-throughs" at the plant and but does not foresee the necessity of additional drills before start-up.

Pankok also asked for a copy of PSE&G's disaster control plan, but was told the company's policy is not to make the plan public.

Copies of the civil defense plan were forwarded to Dr. Granville Thomas, superintendent of Salem City schools, U.S. Rep. William J. Hughes, Assemblyman H. Donald Stewart and the Lower Alloways Creek public safety director, in addition to each of the freeholders.

In a report received from Arnold Willadsen, coordinator of civil defense disaster control in the county, the freeholders were told that a drill had been

conducted June 17, 1976. He reported that civil defense members participated at the nuclear station site, and said it was a full emergency drill short of evacuation.

In other business, the freeholder board received notice that the anticipated traffic light for Buck Road in Pittsgrove Township will not be installed until October. The delay has been caused by the need for special equipment to install the light. The intersection designated for the light has been the scene of serious auto accidents.

The board also received a letter of thanks from Russell Magsam of Alloway, for prompt action in making repairs to the road in front of his home. He had asked for assistance from the board at the July 7 meeting.

Participation with the state in a SLEPA (State Law Enforcement Planning Agency) program for the JINS shelter was approved by the board.

Judiciary freeholder committee chairman Anthony Crescenzi said the county is applying for a grant totalling \$15,000 to expand services at the center for juveniles in need of supervision at the Lakeview facility.

He said the planned outreach program is designed to help staff follow the progress of juveniles after they leave the center and return to a home situation.

Also Wednesday, the salary range for the Salem County jail warden was amended by resolution from \$13,000 to \$16,900 by the freeholders.

The board approved insertion in the budget of an additional \$25,156 received as a Salem County Area Planning grant.
