Dear Sirs:

I would like to take this opportunity to express my opposition to the sale of twin nuclear reactors to President Marcos of the Philippines by Westinghouse for the following reasons:

- (a) The local farmers say that the massive silt run-offs have already wrecked their rice fields and fish farms (in a country where over eight million children suffer from malnutrition and where 57% of the households lack running water);
- (b) The Philippines has already experienced major earthquakes and, in October of 1971 a tidal wave washed close to the site where the reactors are to be located;
- (c) Five volcanoes, four of them active, sit within 100 miles of the site, the nearest one only 10 miles from the proposed site;
- (d) There is no storage site for the plant's radioactive wastes and one national utility executive has suggested that, if nothing else, the wastes could simply be dumped into the ocean (according to the August, 1979 issue of Mother Jones magazine).

It seems to me that this issue touches many more than just the citizens of the Philippines (who are, for the most part, very much opposed to this proposed reactor business). A nuclear reactor disaster (or "accident") and/or the dumping of nuclear wastes into the oceans of the world effects the quality of the lives of all the people on this planet. This push by Westinghouse (and other American corporations who are engaged in making a profit at anyone's expense) smacks of the "ugly American" syndrome and we, the American people, are becoming increasingly tired of



We have learned that grave problems accompany the nuclear plant:

- (1) the site is geologically unstable
- (2) the design has not undergone extensive review
- (3) the question of radioactive waste is still unanswered
- (4) the quality of construction is reportedly substandard and is causing social displacement of people
- (5) its operation will not be economically viable and the energy generated will not benefit the majority of the people.

Since Australia has promised to supply uranium for this nuclear power plant, we feel a common responsibility for whatever negative effects the nuclear plant will cause.

We, therefore, see the move for a moratorium on nuclear power as laudable and worthy of support. We support the efforts of the Filipino people to raise serious questions regarding the effect of the nuclear power industry on the safety of their countrymen and on the development of their country.

In view of this, we stand behind the Petition for Leave to Intervene and Request for Hearing (No. XSNMO-1471) filed by the Centre for Development Policy, J.N. Perlas III, and the Philippine Movement for Environmental Protection which calls for an intensive review and public hearing of all issues pertaining to the Philippine nuclear power plant.

Even though American lives are threatened by PNPP-1 and spent fuel from the Philippine reactor is likely to be returned to the U.S., no full Environmental Impact Statements (EIS) and no detailed health and safety analysis, similar to that done for the licensing of U.S. domestic reactors, has or is being done by the NRC. This is a violation of the Atomic Energy Act of 1954 as amended.

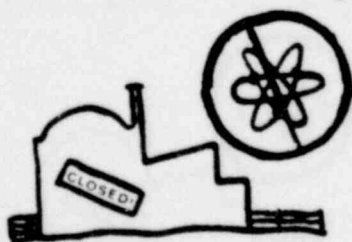

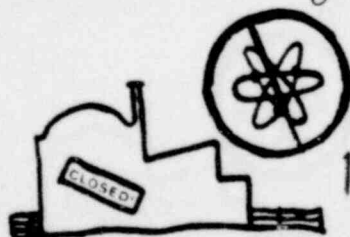

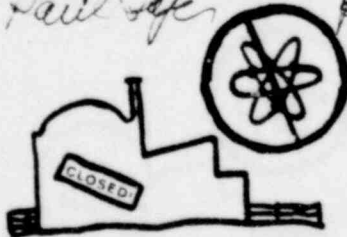

Two things:

(1) I understand you are considering declaring the Three Mile Island accident not to have been a major accident, for insurance purposes, even though the reactor partially melted and pregnant women and children under five were evacuated. I have never done civil disobedience in my life, but I swear if you decide, in your administrative law capacity, that Three Mile Island was not a major accident, then the law is a joke. And the only way to change unjust laws, as Gandhi and Dr. King showed, is breaking the law through civil disobedience.

(2) I also understand you are considering granting an operating license to a Phillipines nuclear power plant which is located on an earthquake fault near four active volcanies in the way of possible tidal waves. I urge you to not grant this plant a license. What does President Carter's human rights policy mean in the Phillipines, a country which has seen the dictatorship of Ferdinand Marcos repress anti-nuclear activists, one of whom has mysteriously disappeared after reporting back to Phillipine police officials.

We, citizens of Australia, are deeply concerned about the nuclear power plant being built by Westinghouse International at Morong, Bataan in the Philippines.

We have learned that grave problems accompany the nuclear plant:

- (1) the site is geographically unstable
- (2) the design has not undergone extensive review
- (3) the question of radio-active waste is still unanswered
- (4) the quality of construction is reportedly substandard and is causing social displacement of people
- (5) its operation will not be economically viable and the energy generated will not benefit the majority of the people.

Since Australia has promised to supply uranium for this nuclear power plant, we feel a common responsibility for whatever negative effects the nuclear plant will cause.

We, therefore, see the move for a moratorium on nuclear power as laudable and worthy of support. We support the efforts of the Filipino people to raise serious questions regarding the effect of the nuclear power industry on the safety of their countrymen and on the development of their country.

In view of this, we stand behind the Petition for Leave to Intervene and Request for Hearing (No.XSNMO-1471) filed by the Centre for Development Policy, J.N. Dear Commission Members,

For environmental and political reasons, I oppose the sale of a nuclear reactor to the dictatorship of Ferdinand Marcos in the Phillipines. Not only do I believe that the Phillipine Islands do not currently have the technological capacity to operate the reactor safely and will not in the near future, I am very much opposed to the proposed site for the reactor. According to current plans, it will sit atop a major earthquake fault in an area plagued by tidal waves and within range of four active volcanoes. If there were a similar community in the United States, I am sure that its residents would not condone the placement of a nuclear reactor there.

Furthermore, in light of evidence that the Marcos dictatorship was responsible for the death, disappearance, or assassination of Ernesto Nazareno, I believe that it would be inconsistent with the United States' human rights policy to sell any reactor to the Phillipines, no matter where the site, until it has been firmly established that Marcos was not responsible for the assassination. There is suspicious evidence that the dictatorship is involved in vigorous suppression of popular feeling against the importation of the reactor, using methods including torture and murder. Morally, the United States should not be a party to the sale of a piece of potentially lethal machinery to a dictator against the will of his country's citizens.

Lastly, along with many other concerned citizens, I find it suspicious that the Marcos regime wants to spend more on one nuclear reactor than on the country's entire agricultural budget for many years. It leads one to suspect that the real reason for buying the reactor is access to its plutonium, which with the aid of scientists from other countries can be used to construct nuclear warheads. A nuclear bomb in the hands of someone like Marcos is a thought that ought to make anyone wary. In the interest of stopping nuclear proliferation worldwide and particularly to unstable, despotic dictatorships, I think the reactor should not be sold to the Phillipines.

I am sure that the Nuclear Regulatory Commission will weigh these pieces of evidence carefully before coming to the right conclusion: that to sell a reactor to Marcos is to be an accomplice in murder.

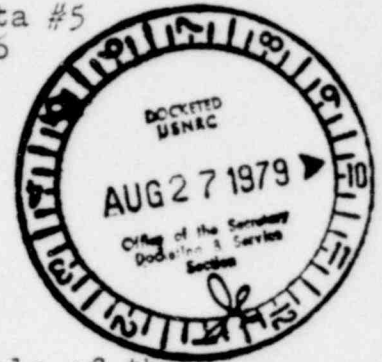
