Dear person:

I am writing to you concerning
the McGuire Nuclear Power Plant.
There are several problems we are
with the opening of this plant.

First of all Charlotte's water
supply comes from only a few
miles downstream from the plant.
I believe this poses considerable
threats for the citizens of Charlotte.

Secondly, where will the waste
that is created from the plant be
stored ultimately? The power
plant has filled their storage tank
and wants to use McGuire's

facilities. This is absurd! What
happens when McGuire's (or McGuire's)
opens and begins filling up its
own storage facilities? I suppose
by then the plan is to ship it
to the Catawba Plant in S.C.

The Cascade Plan will not solve
the long term problem we now face
with our nuclear waste. There is
no solution, not really no solution
our own waste and then act
onments from other countries.

The next course is to wait
around in case McGuire's
facilities are not sufficient to handle

McGuire containment is built
to withstand only 15 pounds of pressure
per square inch. The containment
at Three Mile Island was built
to withstand 65 pounds p.s.i.

During the accident at TMI
the pressure within the containment
reached 28 pounds p.s.i. due to the
rapid hydrogen buildup and combustion.

I have fear of what would
happen at McGuire if an equal
buildup should occur. There are
too many unknown hazards of
radiation for me to feel comfortable
living within the 10 mile radius.

I urge you to reopen the
McGuire licensing hearings as
soon as possible.
