Re: Supplemental Request to FOIA-81-95

Gentlemen:

Examination of documents supplied pursuant to this firm's earlier Freedom of Information Act request, FOIA-81-95, has indicated other documents that would be useful to our inquiry regarding the Fort St. Vrain Nuclear Power Plant ("FSV") in Platteville, Weld County, Colorado. Therefore, I am making a supplemental request pursuant to the Freedom of Information Act for the following documents:



The letter, written by Vincent E. Reed, assistant education secretary for elementary and secondary education, said, "In light of your continuing refusal to cooperate in an accounting system audit, we have no alternative but to decline to make the grant to PUSH."

"We cannot provide funds to organizations that fail to cooperate with the most minimum requirements to account for federal funds."

"Jackson, an activist since the 1960s, said Saturday he never got a copy of the letter."

PUSH for Excellence, an arm of Jackson's Chicago-based Operation PUSH, is an educational program for minorities and the poor launched without federal funding by Jackson in 1976.

The department agreed with Jackson in the late 1970s to give the program \$1 million annually for three years, subject to annual review.

The department simultaneously arranged for a research firm to study the program. Several reports critical of PUSH-EXCEL were issued by the firm in the past few years, saying the program was little more than a series of speeches made by Jackson and others.

15 N-plants 'below average'

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Nuclear Regulatory Commission has classified 15 operating nuclear plants as "below average" and will devote more inspections to them, sources in the agency said Saturday night.

"A rating of below average does not mean the plant is unsafe. We expect high performance from all plants," said one source.

Nine other plants were classified as above average and will get fewer inspections, the sources said. Twenty-six were classified as average and will see no change.

It was the NRC's first attempt to compare all the nation's operating nuclear power plants at the same time.

The plants were rated by senior regional NRC staffers on the basis of management quality, radiation and fire protection, compliance with regulations and the occurrence of events that must be reported to the commission during late 1979 and 1980.

No attempt was made to consider such things as plant electrical efficiency, said the source.

According to Sunday editions of the New York Times, whose rankings were confirmed by NRC sources, the below-average plants were: Arkansas 1 and 2 at Russellville, Ark.; Beaver Valley 1, Shippingport, Pa.; Browns Ferry 1, 2 and 3, Decatur, Ala.; Brunswick 1 and 2, Southport, N.C.; Davis-Besse, Oak Harbor, Ohio; Crystal River 3, Red Level, Fla.; James A. FitzPatrick, Scriba, N.Y.; Indian Point 2, Buchanan, N.Y.; Nine Mile Point 1, Scriba, N.Y.; Oyster Creek Toms River, N.J.; Palisades, South Haven, Mich.; Pilgrim, Plymouth, Mass.; Rancho Seco, Clay Station, Calif.; Salem 1 and 2, Salem, N.J. and Surry 1 and 2, Gravel Neck, Va.

The above-average plants were: Cooper at Brownville, Neb.; Farley Units 1 and 2, Dothan, Ala.; Fort Calhoun, Fort Calhoun, Neb.; Millstone 1 and 2, Waterford, Conn.; Oconee 1, 2 and 3, Seneca, S.C.; Point Beach 1 and 2, Two Crows, Wis.; Prairie Island 1 and 2, Red Wing, Minn.; Vermont Yankee, Vernon, Vt. and Yankee Rowe, Rowe, Mass.

All other operating plants were average.
