

With this letter, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service would like to outline its responsibilities in the event of an emergency at Kansas Gas and Electric Company's Wolf Creek Generating Station. We are prepared to offer assistance to and cooperation with Coffey County with respect to our facilities at the Flint Hills National Wildlife Refuge (FHNWR), and the John Redmond Reservoir (JRR). More specifically, in the event of an emergency, we are prepared to:

1. Upon the request of the Sheriff of Coffey County, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service will carry out emergency procedures in accordance with the current revision of the Coffey County Contingency Plan for Incidents Involving Commercial Nuclear Power (the Contingency Plan), especially Appendix I, which describes our emergency procedures in more detail.
2. Upon the request of the Sheriff of Coffey County or the Coffey County Emergency Preparedness Coordinator, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service will designate locations for emergency information signs or identify procedures for distributing emergency information material, as per the Contingency Plan. It is understood that Coffey County will be responsible for design, production, and installation of these signs and informational materials, and that Coffey County will bear all costs associated with this. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service will then be responsible for maintenance of signs and distribution of the informational material at our expense.
