Dear Sir:

Public Service Electric has announced that it wants to build twin giant nuclear power plants on the Delaware River at Bordentown, New Jersey.

The Atomic Energy Commission announced that a report from the AEC's Advisory Committee on Nuclear Safety finds the site "not unacceptable."

Just two years ago the AEC withdrew provisional approval of a site for two plants at Burlington, N. J., just a few miles down stream from the projected site at Bordentown. The reason given at the time for disapproving the Burlington site was "population density." If anything, the population in the surrounding 50 miles has increased since then, so this site should be unacceptable.

LIFE for September 12, revealed what was wrong with nuclear power plants - their dangerous heating of water and more dangerous discharge of radioactive waste. If boiling waters are approved and built at Bordentown - the orders have been placed - the people in the surrounding communities around the plant will be subject to gaseous radioactive wastes, whose effects could be as harmful to children and young women as the fallout from weapons testing have proven to be,

We protest the plans for these nuclear power plants at Bordentown and respectfully request you to reject the AEC Advisory Report findings that the Bordentown site is "not unacceptable."
