1. What conversations and comments made by personnel on duty in the control room are recorded?

a. If available, provide for TMI-2 during the hours of 4 a. m. until 9 a. m.

2. What data will be, or is planned to be, monitored by NRC staff at an NRC control center according to your Emergency Plan?

3. What will be the mechanism for data transmission?

4. What objects, ^{if} if any would licensee have to providing this data simultaneously to local county commissioners?

5. What was licensee's role in restricting national TV news programming in the Harrisburg area during TMI-2 accident?

6. What studies have been made to assure telephone circuit availability during an emergency?

7. Describe in detail the expected actions to be taken by a shift supervisor in the course of an event which leads to declaration of

a. a site emergency,

b. a general emergency.

8. Provide model scenarios for 7.

Dear Governor Thornburgh,

Enclosed is a letter to the editor of a local newspaper, explaining why I believe a study should be implemented and expedited to decide if there is any connection between the infant hypothyroidism and the accident at TMI-2, or the operation of the nuclear facilities on Three Mile Island. Important decisions are about to be made on the restart of TMI-Unit 1, and the emergency planning for all nuclear facilities. To prolong a study over two years, as Dr. Tokuhata of your health department suggested, would rob these decisions of important information.

I am an intervenor in the TMI-Unit 1 Restart Hearing, because my confidence in government (to protect our health and safety) has been eroded. Yesterday, that confidence was further eroded. In response to press interrogation, Dr. Bodine (state health department) stated, before noon yesterday, that there was no connection whatever between the defects and the accident or any other environmental effect.

Statistically, the clustering of the defects in a rather small area of Lancaster County (more than 10 and less than 30 miles from TMI) infers a strong relationship to location. The data for this small area should be compared with that of other areas of the same size, not lumped with all of Lancaster County.

The attempt to explain away two structural defects and an inheritance factor is to prejudge the question. Were these kinds of cases excluded in comparable statistics for other areas? Do we know all the effects of radiation?

The program of infant screening was instituted about three years ago. Allowing a year for instituting the program, what are the statistics for 1978 for Lancaster County, and for the same small geographical area in question?

The Kemeny and other studies of the TMI-2 accident were expedited. I suggest that ^{the} infant hypothyroidism incident provides some real data that should be checked out, thoroughly and expeditiously, if we, the public, are to perceive government as responsible.





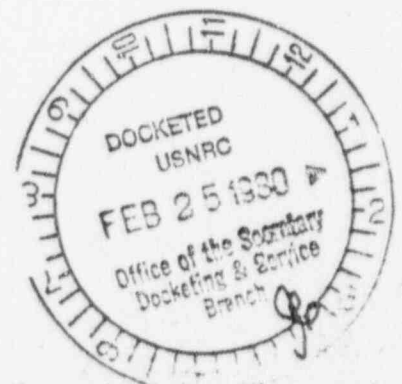
