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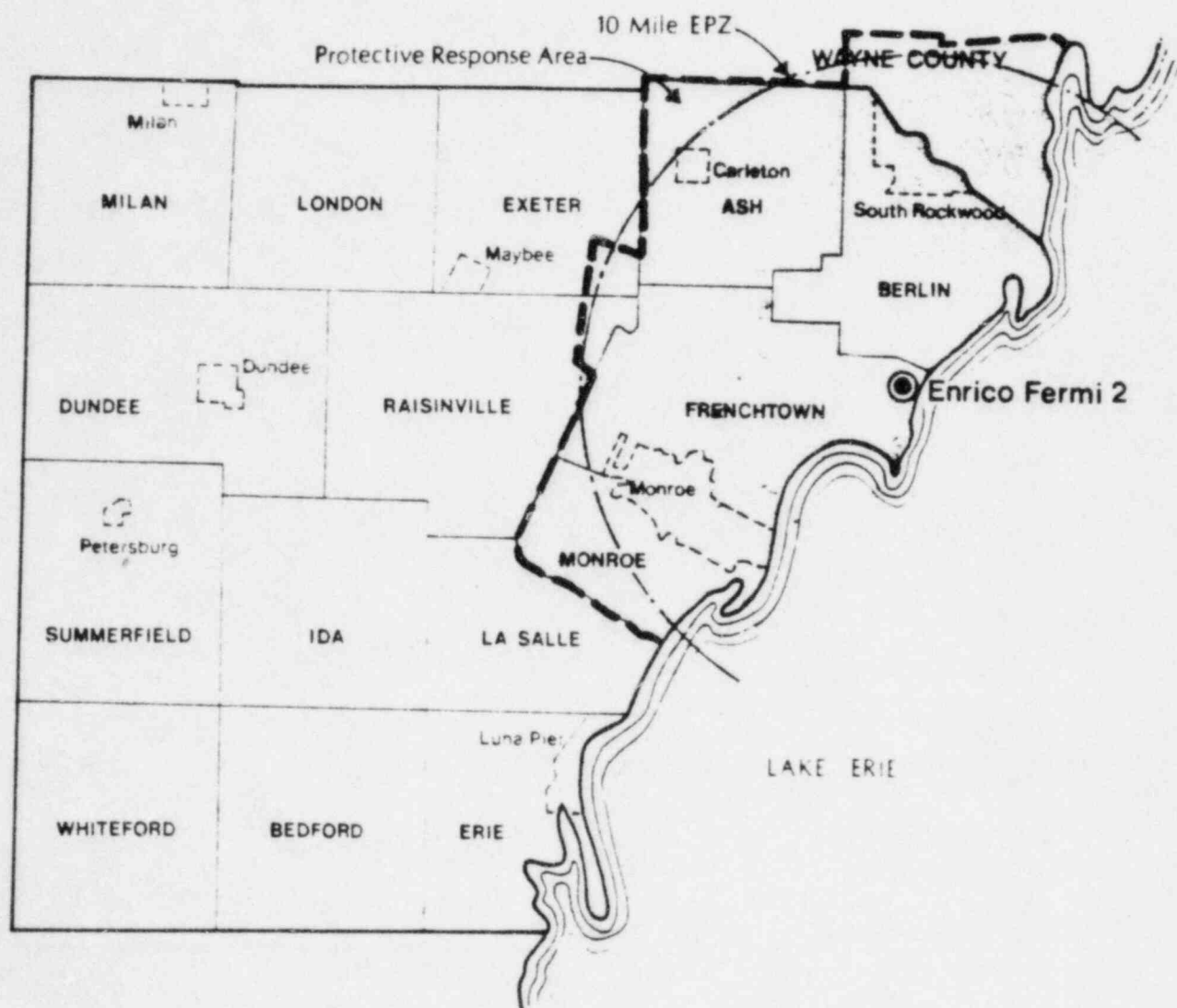


MONROE COUNTY EMERGENCY OPERATIONS PLAN





APPENDIX 1 (NUCLEAR ACCIDENT PROCEDURES)

TO THE HEALTH AND MEDICAL ANNEX

I. PURPOSE

- A. To support the Health and Medical Annex to the Monroe County Emergency Operations Plan.
- B. To provide for the coordination of emergency health and medical resources required to support hospital and special care facility evacuation, provide specialized assistance to members of the general public and assure as far as possible availability and accessibility emergent and urgent medical care services, in the event of a nuclear facility incident.

II. ASSUMPTIONS

- A. In the event of an announcement of an incident at the Alert or higher level, for which no protective action is recommended, spontaneous individual actions may occur to increase demand for transportation of bedfast persons.
- B. The emergency medical transportation resources within Monroe County will be fully utilized to support on-site requirements and to maintain adequate levels of emergency service capability during an incident, and will not be available to meet the requirements for emergency medical transportation for a general evacuation of the primary EPZ.
- C. In the event of an evacuation due to an incident at FERMI-2, substantial transportation capabilities will be required to evacuate the Monroe County population in acute and long-term health care facilities.
- D. Hospitals and other facilities involved in the provision of care to handicapped, ill, or others requiring special transportation to a specialized receiving facility in the event of an evacuation, have primary responsibility for identifying necessary transportation services and receiving facilities, and planning and concluding arrangements in coordination with the Monroe County OCP.
- E. The State of Michigan, through the Michigan Department of Public Health, Emergency Medical Services Division, will coordinate, in consultation with the Michigan State Police, the provision of emergency medical transportation resources from outside of the County with the County Health and Medical Officer, to provide for the evacuation of non-ambulatory persons within the primary EPZ.

III. CONCEPT OF OPERATIONS

- A. In the event of a nuclear incident at FERMI-2, the Health and Medical Officer will be notified according to the procedures established. (Refer to Direction and Control Annex)

- B. The Health and Medical Officer and the Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Transportation Officer will report to the Monroe County EOC at the Alert classification.
- C. The Health and Medical Officer is responsible for the coordination of responses identified within this annex, and will be responsible for mobilizing and directing all of the emergency health/medical resources necessary for the county to respond promptly to a nuclear facility incident.
- D. The Health and Medical Officer will maintain close contact with health care facilities and will coordinate provision of emergency medical transportation through the EMS/Transportation Officer. Emergency medical transportation requirements fall into four primary categories:
1. Transportation for the evacuation of health care facilities including hospitals, nursing homes, and residents of group homes who require medical assistance.
 2. Transportation for the evacuation of members of the general public who are non-ambulatory and require transportation assistance.
 3. Maintenance of emergency medical services capability for responses to the normal, and possibly increased demand, for primary emergency medical services.
 4. Transportation of victims of radiological accidents to designated medical support facility by local ambulance service. (Refer to Attachment H)
- E. Hospitals designated to receive potentially contaminated patients, and host health care facilities agreeing to accept patients from risk health care facilities in the event of an evacuation are shown in Attachments E and F.
- F. Pre-hospital care providers (including both ambulance and fire rescue) and their capabilities are identified in Attachments G and H.
- G. The Michigan Department of Public Health is responsible for directing the use of radioprotective drugs. The Monroe County Health Department, under the direction of the Health/Medical Officer, maintains the supply of Potassium Iodide (KI) under strict security precautions. (Criteria for use of radioprotective drugs are shown in Attachment C.)
- H. Upon notification, Hospitals and Intermediate and Long-Term Care Facilities will conduct appropriate census and classification of patients, effect coordination with pre-determined host facilities, and prepare patients for transportation. Patients of facilities unable to complete expeditious arrangements will be temporarily sheltered at the Ida School Complex. Such facilities will maintain

continued responsibility for staffing. The Social Services/Red Cross personnel will provide administrative support.

I. Communications:

1. Basic communications between risk health care facilities and the EOC will be by telephone.
2. Hospital and mobile medical support communication will be coordinated through the MEDCOM system.
3. Augmented radio communications will be through the use of the Amateur Radio Emergency Service. Units will be assigned to risk and host facilities as appropriate.

IV. ORGANIZATION

- A. The Director of the Monroe County Health Department has been designated as the County Health and Medical Officer.
- B. The EMS/Transportation Officer of the Monroe County Health Department will assist the Health and Medical Officer in the coordination of emergency medical services and personnel and will function as a part of the EOC staff.
- C. The alternate for the Health and Medical Officer will be the Administrator of the Monroe County Health Department. The Administrator will provide 12 hour shift relief to assure twenty-four hour coverage. Second alternate to the Health and Medical Officer will be the EMS/Transportation Officer.

V. TASKS AND EXECUTION

A. NOTIFICATION OF UNUSUAL EVENT

The Health and Medical Officer may be notified and action may be required to supplement response to an onsite emergency.

B. ALERT

1. The Health and Medical Officer and the EMS/Transportation Officer will be notified, both will report to the EOC and will direct completion of the following:
 - a. Notification of key persons, including Health Department Division and Program Heads, Mental Health, Animal Control and the Administrator of Mercy-Memorial Hospital, to assume stand-by status.
 - b. Contact of key emergency personnel and issuance of stand-by team assignments. (See internal operating procedures for names and telephone numbers.) These in turn will follow their internal operating procedures for notifying their key personnel as necessary.

Appendix 1 (Nuclear Facility Procedures) to the Emergency Health and Medical Services Annex

I. PURPOSES

- A. To support the emergency health/medical services annex.
- B. To coordinate the emergency health and medical resources required to protect the public in the event of a nuclear facility incident at the Enrico Fermi Atomic Power Plant.
- C. To identify consultants that can be used in a radiological emergency.
- D. To describe the conditions under which radio-protective drugs will be issued to emergency workers and the general public.
- E. To list the actions to be taken to protect persons with impaired mobility in the event of a nuclear facility incident.
- ✓ F. To identify the hospitals that have an agreement with the nuclear facility to care for victims of a nuclear incident, and all other hospitals, nursing homes, and extended care facilities.
- ✓ G. To identify the ambulance services and other transportation means which will be used to transport exposed persons.
- H. To indicate the present training programs that are applicable to nuclear facility incidents.
- I. To describe the medical/hospital emergency drills to be conducted.
- J. To show the Wayne County Health Department's response for contamination.

II. CONCEPT OF OPERATION

- A. The execution of the assignments of this appendix will be under the direction of the Director of the Wayne County Health Dept.
- B. The Director will be responsible for mobilizing and coordinating all health and medical resources to respond promptly to a nuclear facility incident. The Director or his designee will do this from the Wayne County On-Scene Emergency Operations Center as the Health Operations Officer.
- C. The emergency actions that the Director will be responsible for implementing and the four levels of classification are shown on Attachment A. This includes actions for notification and mobilization of personnel.

III. ORGANIZATION

- A. See Attachment E - Organizational Chart.

IV. TASKS AND EXECUTION

A. Tasks

1. Consultants that can be used in a nuclear facility emergency are shown on Attachment D.
2. The Michigan Department of Public Health Criteria for use of radio-protective drugs to be administered to emergency workers and the general public is shown on Attachment H. The MDPH maintains a quantity of potassium iodide at its central office. When an incident occurs this supply will be transported to the local area. The Director of the county health department will distribute the drugs.
3. The following actions will be taken to protect the physically handicapped/impaired mobility in conjunction with Social Services and/or the local police department.
 - a. Identify the medically impaired within the area of concern.
 - b. Move the medically impaired from the area of concern using school bus or other public transportation. Coordinate with the Intermediate School District.
 - c. If persons in the category cannot be moved they will be advised to take the following actions.
 1. Turn off air conditioners.
 2. Seal windows and doors.
 3. Use self-contained breathing equipment if applicable.
 4. The use of radio-protective drugs will be considered based on the advice of the Michigan Department of Public Health.
- ✓ 4. The hospitals that have agreed to care for radiologically exposed victims are listed on Attachment I. The other hospitals, nursing homes, and extended care facilities are also listed on Attachment I. These are support facilities outside of the 10 mile area. ✓
5. Ambulance services and other medical transportation will be coordinated by the Director.
6. Attachment H shows the training programs and sponsors available to maintain the emergency preparedness capability of health and medical personnel.

Appendix 1 (Nuclear Facility Procedures) to the Emergency Health and Medical Services Annex (continued)

7. The criteria and decisional aid for decontamination is shown in Attachment J. The Office of Emergency Preparedness (OEP) will establish decontamination centers as necessary. The County Health Department is responsible for providing health care staffing.
8. At congregate care centers, the County Health Department will assure food and water is sanitary.
9. The Mental Health Board in cooperation with Social Services will be available for contact and coordination during the disaster to aid and counsel people.
10. The Director will ensure that public health emergency workers working in an area where they could be exposed are issued dosimeters. He will coordinate with the Radiological Defense Officer in designating a fire station where the emergency workers will report to receive their dosimeters. Refer to the Radiological Defense Appendix for more details. The Director will control exposure to workers under his coordination. Refer to the Radiological Defense Appendix for exposure control criteria.
11. Provide all other health and medical support which is outlined in the Emergency Health and Medical Services Annex.

B. Communications

- ✓ 1. Hospital and ambulance communication will be coordinated through the MEDCOM System utilizing HEMS radio. Basic communications between field teams and the Wayne County On-Scene EOC will be by telephone. The MEDCOM System could provide backup radio support. ✓
2. Augmented radio communications will be with the use of Police Radio, Amateur Radio Service, Citizen Band Services, Civil Air Patrol, and in cooperation with the County Emergency Preparedness Communications Officer.

C. Execution

1. When notified by the Wayne County warning entry point of an incident at the nuclear facility the Health Director or his designate will gather his staff, brief them and make assignments in accordance with Attachment A as necessary.
2. Upon declaration of a state of emergency by the County Executive, the Director or his designate will coordinate health services from the Wayne County On-Scene Emergency Operating Center.

Appendix 1 (Nuclear Facility Procedures) to the Emergency Health and Medical Services Annex (continued)

3. Upon declaration of a state of emergency by the County Executive, he will direct the disaster relief forces of the County in accordance with Act 390. Upon the declaration of a state of disaster by the Governor also under Act 390, the health and medical services will become part of the total statewide relief effort.

- ✓ 4. If Wayne County needs assistance, they may petition the state. Under a Governor's state of disaster declaration, state resources shall be utilized to assist Wayne County. If the state needs extra resources, it may request that a presidential disaster declaration be made. The various agencies of the federal government may also be available to provide assistance on this basis. The Michigan Department of Public Health maintains a list of nuclear and other facilities, organizations, or individuals which can be relied upon in an emergency to provide assistance.
