Dear Mr. Gerber:

Thank you for your letter dated January 13, 1984, regarding disposal of records related to your NRC licenses which were terminated prior to 1980.

As we discussed on the telephone, NRC regulations are not explicit regarding disposal of records when a license is terminated. As we agreed, it would be appropriate for Picker to retain records related to questions which may arise in the future regarding personnel exposures or radioactive contamination of facilities. Therefore, you should retain records of personnel exposures and contamination surveys. Also, you may wish to consider transfer to Advanced Medical Systems any radiation records related to employees or facilities which were transferred from Picker to Advanced Medical Systems.

I would also direct your attention to 10 CFR Section 20.408 which requires radiation exposure records of terminated employees to be furnished to NRC. You may wish to check to make sure you have complied with this requirement for any employees who did not transfer to Advanced Medical Systems.

SUBJECT: CLOSING OF ALLEGATION FILE (AMS NO. RIII-91-A-0017)
REGARDING ALLEGED RADIOACTIVE DUMP SITE ALONG CLEVELAND,
OHIO LAKEFRONT

On February 5, 1991, Russ Marabito, Public Affairs Coordinator, received a telephone call from an individual concerned that radioactive materials were buried along a particular area of the lakefront in Cleveland, Ohio. An allegation plan was developed (AMS No. RIII-91-A-0017) and on February 13, 1991, an NRC inspector performed radiological surveys of the area. Excessive radiation levels were not identified. Therefore, no further action was taken and the allegation was considered closed.

On February 8, 1994, the allegation was reopened because, in an unrelated issue, more extensive surveys were performed in the same area from November through December 1993, identifying traces of cobalt-60. The surveys were conducted by a contractor hired by the Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District (NEORS D).

Further surveys were conducted from April through August 1994, by NEORS D contractors and NRC inspectors characterizing the Easterly Wastewater Treatment Plant (EWTP) grounds and surrounding areas. The surveys identified cobalt-60 in several locations on the surface of the EWTP grounds. The surface areas were remediated. Attached is NRC Inspection Report No. 999-90003/94042(DRSS), which explains the purpose for the inspection, characterization, and remediation of the EWTP grounds.

It was concluded, through the conduct of surveys and remediation efforts on the surface of the EWTP grounds and surrounding areas, that a radiological health and safety hazard does not exist. Also, regarding the 1991 allegation (AMS No. RIII-91-A-0017), 1.3 million curies of cobalt-60 were not identified in the area. Therefore, this allegation is again considered closed.

Due to my pending reassignment to the Reactor Support Programs Branch, it is essential that we re-establish our team to be responsible for the AMS and NEOSD projects. Serving as my replacement as team coordinator will be Jack Grobe. Jack will be responsible for the coordination aspects of the project and will serve as principal spokesperson for AMS issues.

John Madera will continue his involvement with AMS with principal emphasis on license renewal as well as the forthcoming Decommissioning Funding Plan.

Wayne Slawinski will remain as principal inspector for AMS until license renewal. At that time, Michael Weber will assume inspection responsibilities for the facility. Until the time of that transfer, Wayne will be responsible for followup activities involving the Hazard Assessment as well as Emergency Preparedness concerns identified during the last routine inspection. Wayne will also continue with the oversight of source transfer activities as well as the plug removal project. Jack Grobe will be responsible for the oversight of these activities.

We will need to continue our close coordination of activities with NMSS as well as with Gary Shear's branch. We are at a critical stage with the issues involving both AMS and NEOSD, and as such, effective teamwork is imperative.
