NRC Review of Wolf Creek Donating Land to Stringtown Cemetery

Public Meeting: October 15, 2025

Introduction to the Wolf Creek Land Release

- Wolf Creek Generating Station (the licensee) is asking to release 4.46 acres of land for unrestricted use.
- The land is located about 0.80 miles north-northwest of the plant, next to the Stringtown Cemetery.
- The area is considered “non-impacted,” meaning it has no detectable radioactive contamination above natural levels.

Why Is This Land Being Released?

- The Stringtown Cemetery Board requested a land donation to expand the cemetery to the north.
- The land has never been used by the power plant, and it is outside plant exclusion areas (radiation controlled areas), including safety boundaries.
- There is no reasonable chance that the land has been affected by plant activities.

How the NRC Evaluates the Request?

- The NRC checks if the land is truly “non-impacted” and that submitted information is complete.
- The licensee ensures that releasing the land will not affect public safety, emergency plans, or plant security.
- The licensee confirms that monitoring programs are updated as needed.

What Happens Next?

- The public can submit comments about the proposed release until October 15, 2025.
- Wolf Creek is requesting approval from the NRC by December 31, 2025.
- The NRC will make a decision based on its evaluation.

Key Takeaways
